



Community Leaders “Focus on the Positive” at Envision Coastal Alabama Summit

More than 200 Baldwin and Mobile county residents tackled complex issues relating to economy, education, environment and equity at the Daphne Civic Center at the July 10 Envision Coastal Alabama Community Summit.

Topics ranged from regional sewer systems to marketing public education. Each group agreed on the same formula for achieving success – focus on the positive . . . communicate . . . collaborate.

In less than two months, more than 300 regional citizens joined Envision action teams. Many new volunteers attended the summit that served as Envision’s official kick-off for phase two of the regional strategic plan. Participants shared ideas for new projects and enthusiastically accepted the challenge to re-energize and refocus Envision’s efforts for regional collaboration.

Donna Watts, president of the South Baldwin Chamber of Commerce, called volunteers to action saying, “We are not suggesting that any city or community give up or leave behind the unique characteristics that make Baldwin and Mobile the desirable areas they are; but rather we are asking that you consider setting aside personal agendas and checking your ego at the door and open your mind to the opportunities that lie ahead of us through our joined efforts.”

In his closing remarks, John Davis, former Envision chairman and president of Mobile Gas, commented that we may ask ourselves if the visioning and strategizing process makes a difference. “Yes” is the resounding answer to that question, as Davis said: “Vision sets the mark for which we all strive . . . Working together, embracing a unified

vision, we are making a difference . . . Realizing the vision is not a task for the few, nor is it likely to be achieved by the faint of heart. . . We and many more of our friends and neighbors must be actively involved, we must be bold and caring, we must be committed and purposeful, and we must be passionate in order to seize the day.”

Participants in the environment breakout session were eager to share their ideas for future Envision projects. Led by E-chairs Charlotte Cabaniss Robertson and Cathy O’Keefe, the environment group discussed several projects and included regional recycling, a regional sewer plan and regional public transportation within their top priorities. They emphasized the overlapping issues within the four Envision compass points and the need for collaboration between the four groups to create a sustainable coastal community. Envision leaders hope the newly launched on-line communications tool (see next page) will facilitate increased collaboration among the four focus areas.



There was standing room only for the Economy breakout session led by E-chairs Bob Mullican and Terry Harbin. The Economy Group discussed many issues and identified regional tourism, smart growth and comprehensive regional planning among their top priorities. They also emphasized the need for increased communication, not just collaboration, between the two counties. The group agreed that “focusing on the positive” should be Envision’s theme for phase two.



The “Focus on the Positive” theme continued in the Education breakout session led by Carolyn Akers and Dee Fuhrman. The group placed marketing public education and emphasizing positive developments among their top priorities. They also noted the fragmentation among grassroots groups in both counties. Education leaders on both sides of the bay hope to unify grassroots volunteers through increased collaboration and communication to achieve even greater advancements in public education.

Baldwin County Public Transit Coalition Director Stan Virden swaps business cards with Mobile Metro Transit Manager Bob Williams. The group enjoyed an energetic discussion of transportation issues and agreed a primary goal should be securing a dedicated funding source for our regional transportation projects. Plans are already underway for a regional transportation summit. The Equity group also discussed implementing an apprenticeship program in schools and businesses for students interested in learning a trade without attending college.
